



The average residential home in Riverview costs \$162,625 with a property tax assessment of \$2,574. 'PAY AS YOU GO' FUND FOR CAPITAL PROJECTS


 Direct funds for capital projects which reduces the Town's need to incur more debt for infrastructure investments.
